#### **RESEARCH SUMMARY**

My research seeks to understand how experiencing violence influences noncombatants' views of the responsible actors in Iraq and Syria. I ask: why do civilians sometimes support groups that harm them or their communities? I have conducted fieldwork in Lebanon and Jordan, where I interviewed Syrian and Iraqi refugees in Arabic. I am currently completing field interviews in Berlin, Germany. My general research interests include the dynamics of civil war, other forms of political violence, and research methods.
